FSUSBC Tournaments

A reminder to all local associations **June 30th is the deadline** to bid on our 7 state tournaments for 2025. The **PEPSI** runs 5 weekends in March and April, skipping Easter This past year had 2600 entrants way up in Tallahassee. The **OPEN**, our largest tournament, runs 8 weekends in May and June. This year around 600 team entries. The **YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP** runs 3 weekends beginning the first weekend of June. This past year there were over 300 team entries. The **Women's Championship runs** 3 weekends and is held the last 2 weeks of May and the 1st week of June. The **Mixed**

Tournament is held the first 2 weeks of April. The **Women's Senior Tournament**, for women over 50, runs 2 weekends and is held the first 2 weekends in November. **The Men's Tournament runs** 4 weekends and is held the last weekend of October and the first 3 weekends of November.

Submit a bid today, you owe it to your members to host a tournament in their area. On all of our adult tournaments the locals receive 75% on all profits at the end of the tournament you host. It is a great opportunity to increase your association bottom line! Here we are going into the 6th month of the year already. Hard to believe that half a year is almost over and we will be moving into the fall season for league bowling. Where has the time gone?

On the local scene all local tournaments are in the history books. Participation was down a little and there are many reasons for the decline. No need to rehash what most all associations are facing so let's try and be positive that the summer leagues will see an increase and the fall season will pick up as well.

The annual general membership meeting of the Marion County USBC Association was held on May 6, 2023, and attendance was slight to say the least considering there are approximately 800 certified bowlers 14 or older eligible to attend. Elections were held and there was no real business to discuss so the meeting was short and to the point. If you were not at the meeting to ask questions, then don't complain about how something is done by the association if you are not willing to be a part of the solution do not always be the one causing the problem.

There will be one inductee into the Marion County USBC Hall of Fame for superior performance, Charlie Axe, Jr. Also being recognized will be Vito Sisto for setting a new city

record of 890 in November 2022, along with recognition of Keith Dumphy for his work with the youth and his contribution of funds to offset their bowling fees for several months. All these festivities will be held on June 10, 2023, at the Braised Onion Restaurant. Congratulations to all of these individuals for their accomplishments.

A question came up the other day about the certification sticker on the doors of the local bowling centers. Some of the bowlers assumed that the lanes were being inspected or certified and that is why the sticker is on the door. That is not the case. The last time the lanes were physically inspected by a team of officers/directors from the local association board was in 2017. Since that time USBC "grand fathered" in all centers and just send out stickers yearly. There are issues with pins not being on spot and probably lanes that are not within specifications; however, USBC has said that they are sending around inspection crews to inspect and certify lanes. Unsure when that is going to happen here in Ocala.

In addition, the foul lights at one of the centers has not been working for several years and we heard that they were working on them, and the gentleman got "shocked" so they are having to bring in someone else to try and track down where the issue is. Will we ever have foul lights - who knows?

New fans were installed, and lights were hard wired into the fan so that when the fan is turned on the light comes on (an orange bulb - not white) and the light generates heat so why turn on the fan if it is going to push hot air down on the bowler??? Just wondering why the lights had to be hard wired with the fan so there is no way to not have the light on? Again, AMF at its finest.

The Open and Women's State Tournaments are in full swing and current (unofficial) standings are posted on the Florida State USBC website and sometimes on their Facebook page. The Open Tournament concludes the end of June and the Women's Tournament concludes on June 4.

I am honored that the Florida State USBC Association allowed me to assume the position of Tournament Director for the Florida State USBC Women's State Tournament. We have 2 weeks completed and one week to go. It has been a pleasure greeting all the ladies that come from around the state to participate and to put faces to some of the names that I have talked with on the phone or corresponded with via e-mail. As with anything there have been some bumps along the road, but it will all work out. Not all the issues have been with the tournament but with the center in which one of the events is being held. In 2024 all events (team/doubles/singles) will be held in one center so the squads should be larger, and it should be easier traveling to one center each day to participate. I think that is about all there is for now. See you in the Fall.

Modern Technology VS Old School – Bowling Scores

Technology is always evolving and improving. This is true for bowling. Bowling balls for example are always changing as it seems the bowling ball manufacturers have new models out there every year.

For this topic, we will be talking about the bowling scoring system. In most of today's modern bowling centers they have an automatic scoring system.

Back in the day bowling scores were done by hand where you had to do the math to add up the scores. It may be simple enough, but do you know how to score after a spare or a strike? When was the last time that you took score and did the math adding the frames up?

The traditional bowling center of the early 20th century was advanced in automation when the pinsetter person ("pin boy"), who set back up by hand the bowled down pins, was replaced by a machine that automatically replaced the pins in their proper play positions in the 1950's.

The automatic scorer was first field tested at Village Lanes bowling center, Chicago in 1967. The scoring machine received approval for official use by the American Bowling Congress in August of that year. They were first used in national official league gaming on October 10, 1967. In November Brunswick announced that they were accepting orders for the new digital computer, which cost around \$3,000 per bowling lane. Bowling centers that installed these new automatic scoring devices in the 1970s charged a dime extra per line of scoring for the convenience.

So that is the history of the automatic scorer. Some of us, who are old enough, might remember coming to the bowling center to bowl and getting a paper scoresheet or overhead transparency scoresheet that was projected on the screen above the lanes.

So, with modern technology evolving the question does come up. Do you know how to keep score? Do the current youth bowlers know how to keep score? The youth probably never heard of a transparency scoresheet. Do the seniors in the bowling centers know how to keep score? Do bowlers on your leagues know how to properly keep score?

These are interesting questions to be asked to the bowlers in your association and of your board members. So, the next time you are at your bowling league or local tournament ask the bowlers around you.

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Do you know how to keep score?

The answers that you get may surprise you. We are all depending on the latest technology to help us out in the world today to make life easier. But sometimes you just must go back and reminisce of how I took score back in the day.

As the school year ends, the senior class graduates are preparing a new chapter in their future. Continuing with their education, entering the service branches, or entering the workforce.
