### **FSUSBC Tournaments**

A reminder to all local associations **June 30th is the deadline** to bid on our 7 state tournaments for 2026.

All bids submitted must have the lineage verification signed by the proprietor placing the bid and bid letter must be in the proposal as well.

The **PEPSI** runs 5 weekends in March and April, skipping Easter weekend. approximately 2900 entries.

The **OPEN**, our largest tournament, runs 8 weekends in May and June. This year around 600 entries. (5 on a team)

The **YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP** runs 3 weekends beginning the first weekend of June. This past year around 275 entries.

The Women's Championship runs 3 weekends and is held the last 2 weeks of May and the 1st week of June.

The Mixed Tournament is held the first 2 weeks of April. 182 entries.

The Women's Senior Tournament runs 2 weekends for women over 50 and is held the last 2 weekends of October. We have a NEW FORMAT, each event optional where the ladies can bowl all 3 events or they can choose to bowl singles only or doubles only.

The **Men's Tournament** runs 4 weekends and is held the last weekend of October and the first 3 weekends of November.

Submit a bid today, host a tournament in your area. On all of our adult tournaments the locals receive 75% on all profits for the tournament you host. It is a great opportunity to make money for your local association and give your local bowlers a chance to bowl in a state tournament without traveling.

Being the first bowling alley with string pins in my area was definitely a shell shock for my community, and me included. At first, I did not realize how strenuous this experience would be, and the determination I would need in order to even progress. The string pins caused a major setback for me. I had to adjust physically, but especially mentally. The pins can have some extremely unlucky reactions no matter how well you throw the ball or even a lucky reaction from the strings just flailing around knocking over unexpected pins. Regardless, the various reactions have taught me to stay relaxed, don't get too frustrated, and try to adjust accordingly. It was very hard for me initially to not just completely shut down after the 3rd or 4th bad reaction, but eventually I started to just laugh at it and move on. After a few months of hard work and tons of frustration, I've noticed the string pins have brought back fun to my game. String pins or free fall, we all get bad reactions every now and then, thus the importance of having a solid mental game. The Pepsi tournament in March was the first tournament I had been in since string pins, and I was worried to say the least. Although that tournament was the best I've ever bowled in a consecutive 12 games, especially in a big tournament like that. With the string pins being very difficult, it made me realize how easy free fall was when I have a good mentality and had locked down my form. Although those string pins get frustrating, I'm overall grateful for the experience because those pins have shown me how important my mental game is. Anyone could have amazing form and perfect technique, but without a strong mentality no player can truly progress their overall game.

#### 2024 Florida Pepsi was a record setter!

The 2024 Florida Pepsi and Youth Bowling Championships were held in beautiful Tavares at Lakeside Lanes, the heart of Lake County. Lakeside Lanes is a 40 lane, very well-run center with restaurant quality food service. Discover Lake County donated \$20,000 to our scholarship fund, helping us to award almost \$100,000 in scholarships. Along with brackets, we awarded \$105,686.

This year saw a record number of qualifiers for the tournament with 2899 entrants. Scholarships were awarded to 419 bowlers in 14 divisions. Awards ranged from \$600 to \$100 to participants SMART accounts at USBC.

The last day of competition saw some amazing bowling. The U15 Boys were on fire! Dylan Beck from Port St. Lucie shot games of 300 and 289 for an 832 three game series (a tournament record). Cameron Morton from Jacksonville shot 300 and 268 for a 794 series. Emmanuel Guevara from Largo shot 278 and 289 with an 805 series. Randy Ayala, U18, from Cape Coral shot games of 299 and 266! All of this incredible bowling was rolled at the same time. There was a lot of excitement for these young athletes!

The tournament sends 6 bowlers to Jr. Gold annually, along with 2 boys and 2 girls from the U18 division of the Florida Handicap to National Youth Open Championships. Both events will be held in the Detroit metro area this July. For the first time ever, we had to have a roll-off to determine our girls representatives on the team. The roll-off was held at Sparez in Davie. Coach Vinny Sica conducted the mini-event for us. One of the young ladies was from Bird Bowl in Miami and the other Greenacres in Palm Beach. Congratulations to Angelie B. from Miami on winning the spot!

We saw some pretty large crowds and squads over our 5 weeks of competition. With the growth of the tournaments, we will be expanding to 6 weekends next year in Tallahassee. Visit Tallahassee has offered up \$25,000 in added scholarship for 2025. Our schedule for the 2024-25 season will be announced in early August.

Encourage youth bowlers to attend this meeting so you know what is happening in your state. Luncheon cost is \$15 for youth and \$25 for adult, purchased ahead of time. Contact Florida State USBC to get tickets. Come out and support the youth. At the luncheon they give out awards, and then the actual youth meeting begins, where elections are held and this is where you as a youth can get involved in your state association. I wanted to mention 2 young ladies in our association who graduated high school and moved away to go to college. They are both bowling on their college teams. First there is Madison Colston. Her first year of college went by in the blink of an eye. The experience and knowledge that she has gained by attending UAB are invaluable in every aspect of her life, not just bowling. UAB became her second home because of the people and community there. Her coursework and bowling take up a ton of her time, but when she is free, she will take the opportunities to volunteer for other team sporting events or organizations in the community. By giving her the opportunity to help the community she feels that she has truly made an impact during her first year. Not only has she and her team made an impact in the community, but also in the classroom and on the lanes. They have managed to have a team GPA of a 3.5 and make it to sectionals for the first time in a few years. There were many highs and lows to the season, but overall, she feels that they put their heart and soul into everything they did no matter what the result. Madison keeps in touch with her friend Victoria Porta, who is going to McKendree University and is also on her bowling team. Victoria just finished her first year at McKendree University in Lebanon, Illinois and it's safe to say she embarked quite a journey while being there. She is majoring in Sociology - Criminal Justice Track, with a

Minor Legal Studies to pursue her bachelor's degree and a Juris Doctor. She is enrolled in MCK 3+3 Law Program that allows 3 years at McKendree to complete her Gen-Eds, Major, and Minor requirements and 3 years at Saint Louis University for Law School. Being a part of a team that wants to see you succeed in all areas of your life is the best feeling on the planet. The growth she has experienced as an individual and bowler is mind boggling. Good Morning Florida. Hard to believe that half of the year is almost gone. We are at the beginning of June; summer leagues are in full swing and before we can blink fall leagues will be forming and the cycle will go on.

I had the privilege of representing the State of Florida at the USBC National Convention in Las Vegas, Nevada, as one of the State Delegates. The workshops were not as many as in past years; however, I did attend the Rules Seminar, How To Talk To People Who Are Not You, Communications and Bias is Everywhere. The motivational speaker brought everyone to their feet. His theme was everyone should have a BUD - Big Unreasonable Dream - you have to want to achieve something that is so far out that you have to go outside your comfort zone in order to achieve it. The only proposed rule change was withdrawn so there was no legislation to vote on. The good news was that the proposed due increase at the national level is being postponed as tournament participation has increased at the national levels (not to mention that the cost has gone up as well) so that the governing board feels that they should have enough operating funds to be good until at least 2027 when they will possibly bring to the delegation a proposed dues increase at the national level. At the state level the Women's Championship Tournament concluded on June 2, 2024. The tournament was hosted by the Gulf Coast USBC and Seminole Lanes. This year we had 182 entries of which 4 were doubles and singles only with the others being team, doubles/singles and all events. All events took place at Seminole Lanes, which is a 60-lane center. Unofficial standings will be posted on the Florida State website and on our Facebook page by Monday afternoon following the close of the tournament. The tournament director has 30 days to verify the standings and make the tournament official at which time checks can be cut to those who cashed in the tournament.

In reference to averages the tournament had 30 ladies with an average of 200-209 and 33 ladies with averages of 210 up to 222. There were two 280 games, several 275 or higher games and overall scoring was above average. There was one 300 game rolled by Jill Winters of The Villages which earned her a 50 over on-site award as well as a USBC Honor Score.

The first-place winners in all the tournament events (team, doubles, singles and all events both handicap and scratch) will receive a letter inviting them to the Florida State Annual Awards Dinner in October where they will receive their plaque. They will also receive a dinner ticket for themselves and a guest. The awards dinner will be held on Saturday, October 12, 2024, at the St. Petersburg/Marriott Clearwater located on Roosevelt Boulevard in St. Petersburg.

For the 2025 Women's State Championship Tournament we will be in the Broward County area at Strikers, which is a 40-lane center, and we will hold all the events of the tournament in that one center. You will need to get your entries in as soon as you can to ensure you get the dates/times you need. The team captain will use the USBC portal to register their teams, doubles/singles and all events. If you are registering more than one team, etc. you will need to make sure and link the entries so that you are on the same date/time. I will be available to assist any team captain if they have questions or need assistance.

I will have a new e-mail address and a new mailing address for anyone who mails in their entries. This information will be posted on the Florida State website, the Florida State Facebook page and it will be on the printed entry forms.

On the local scene in Marion County, we have a new general manager at Bowlero East, Charlene and a new front desk supervisor, Craig. Bowlero West has a new manager, Tim. Unsure how long they will be with Bowlero as staff changes regularly. Lineage goes up every fall and at the current rate Bowlero is about to price themselves out of league business.

Bowlero West has had some renovations going on to restructure the bar, enlarge the arcade and other minor cosmetic changes. Again, all to slowly and quietly ease the leagues out of their centers.

They removed the lockers indicating that to the bowlers that they did not want steady customers as most of the bowlers enjoyed leaving their equipment at the center as they did not have to take it home after bowling. People who used to bowl at least 2 or more leagues are cutting back to one league because of the price of lineage. That is not the only cost associated with league bowling as there is the prize fund and secretary/treasurer fee which makes what the bowler put in their pay envelope weekly just shy of a decent meal in a restaurant.

Lanes in the Marion County area have not been certified in a little over 5 years and the bowlers are beginning to notice that pins are not always on spot or that certain pins are being dropped on a regular basis and the list goes on. USBC took over lane certification and unfortunately it has not gone as well as they had planned. The fact that the lanes are "grandfathered in" for any honor scores that may be bowled is not a good thing. At this point in time, it is hard to say if the lanes are within the specifications set forth by USBC.

The number of certified leagues is declining even if the number of certified bowlers is on a slight increase. Hard to say where USBC gets their figures.

At any rate Marion County will be holding their league officer workshop the beginning of August so that the officers can pick up their league supplies and find out if there were any changes at the USBC convention that could affect their league.

The heat index is on the rise so be sure to hydrate if you do have to be outside and limit your time outside. See you on the lanes.

## The Future of Bowling

The Future of Bowling - Comparing One-Handed and Two-Handed Styles

Bowlers employing this style cup the ball with both hands, utilizing a two-handed approach during the backswing and release.

#### Advantages:

Increased Revolutions - Two-handed bowlers often generate more revolutions on the ball, leading to enhanced hook potential and pin action.

Higher Ball Speed - With the added momentum from the two-handed approach, bowlers can achieve higher ball speeds, crucial for navigating challenging lane conditions.

Reduced Injury Risk - Distributing the weight of the ball across both hands can alleviate strain on the wrist and shoulder, potentially reducing the risk of overuse injuries.

### Disadvantages:

Less Precision - The two-handed approach may sacrifice some precision compared to one-handed bowling, as coordinating the movements of both hands can be challenging.

Learning Curve - Mastering the intricacies of the two-handed technique requires time and dedication, making it less accessible to beginners or casual bowlers.

Lane Condition Play - While advantageous on certain lane conditions, the two-handed style may struggle to adapt to less favorable oil patterns, requiring bowlers to refine their skillset for optimal performance.

So, the Bowler's choice between one-handed and two-handed bowling styles ultimately boils down to personal preference, skill level, and individual bowling goals. ## **FSUSBC Hall of Fame**

Being on a Hall of Fame committee, we have to be open-minded to the uniqueness of each person's career. Over time, it became necessary to implement minimum standards by which a person becomes eligible for the Florida State USBC Hall of Fame.

Subjectivity is an issue when it comes to a HOF nominee. Before the formation of our current unified state association, standards for our state HOF were shall we say "varied". Prior to the merger, one boy was inducted who today would not make the minimum eligibility. He did not have a single state title of any kind, nor was he close to having the minimum number of 300 games to get eligibility credit for even that category. Since I was not a part of the youth HOF committee discussion, I can't speak to what was important at that time. But today, he simply would not be accomplished enough to even make it onto our youth state HOF ballot, let alone get voted in or not.

Back in the day, state HOF applications were submitted by moderate to exceptionally qualified individuals. Starting in the 2000s, more and more applications were coming in with very limited accomplishments, many of which would not even make it into a local HOF, let alone the state HOF. One year, there were 24 state HOF applications for ability with only about half worthy of state HOF consideration. That's why in 2020 the FSUSBC board implemented a minimum standards criterion for men, women, boys, and girls to be eligible for state HOF consideration.

Since its merger in 2018, I believe our unified Florida State USBC association has accomplished a great deal across all aspects of bowling in Florida. I certainly believe the Hall of Fame committee has come a long way in strengthening its standards for eligibility/induction of only the most accomplished bowlers in the Sunshine State. Having first served on the state Hall of Fame committee in 2015, I felt last year's class in 2023 had the strongest-ever HOF nomination class I had seen. Since we have a limit of two inductees per category, those nominees that did not get in last year were carried forward to this year's ballot. Combined with the new nominations that have come in, this year's group of HOF nominees is arguably even more impressive. There was little doubt the implementation of our current HOF eligibility guidelines has helped to ensure the highest standard of what it means to be a Florida State USBC Hall of Famer.
